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## Guide for the Applicants for ESRC North West Doctoral Training Centre Postgraduate Awards (September 2011)

### INTRODUCTION

These Notes of Guidance are intended for those who wish to apply to the Universities of Liverpool, Lancaster and Manchester for an Economic and Social Research (ESRC) postgraduate award under the new ESRC North West Doctoral Training Centre (NWDTC) scheme to support masters or doctoral study in Social Sciences from September 2011. It sets out the types of awards provided, eligibility and the procedures for application.

**It is therefore crucial that you read these carefully before making your application.**

### 1. THE FUNDING SCHEMES

The ESRC provides funding to enable students to study at Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in the UK at both master's and doctoral level and their postgraduate awards programme is administered in five separate schemes.

#### **1+3 Scheme**

This scheme will provide support for students undertaking Master's programmes that focus on advanced study and research training explicitly intended to provide a foundation for further research at doctoral level, followed by a doctoral programme.

#### **2+2 Scheme**

This scheme is only available for students in Economics and in Social Anthropology with Visual Media. It will provide support for students undertaking an MRes programme followed by a doctoral programme.

#### **+3 Scheme**

This scheme will provide support for up to three years of full-time study, or five years of part-time study, on a programme leading to the award of a doctoral degree.

#### **+4 Scheme**

This scheme will provide support for up to four years of full-time study on a programme leading to the award of a doctoral degree.

#### **CASE/Collaborative scheme**

This scheme will involve some form of collaboration with other public, private or third sector organisations.

## **2. ELIGIBILITY**

### **Academic eligibility:**

- For all awards, candidates must have qualifications of the standard of a good honours degree at first or upper second class level, from a UK academic institution and a Masters degree for +3 applications. In the majority of cases, candidates will have undertaken an undergraduate course and/or Masters course at a recognised UK higher education institution. However, some may have qualifications from outside the UK, or be able to offer a combination of qualifications and/or experience. In both cases, it will be necessary to ascertain whether these qualifications can be equated to an honours degree, and at what level.
- The ESRC bases its assessments of qualifications attained outside the UK on the British Council's NARIC guide.
- Candidates must be planning to study in an ESRC recognised pathways (see appendix 1 for a list of recognised pathways).

### **Residential eligibility:**

- Candidates must have a relevant connection with the UK in order to qualify for a full award. This includes candidates who have been ordinarily resident in the UK throughout the 3 year period preceding the date of application and resident for this 3 year period for reasons other than education. Also candidates that have settled status in the UK within the meaning of the Immigration Act 1971.
- Candidates from EU countries other than the UK are now eligible for full awards maintenance, tuition fees and Research Training Support Grant (RTSG) if they have been resident in the UK for at least three years prior to the start of their programme.
- Candidates from EU countries who have not resided in the UK for three years prior to the start of their programme will be eligible for a fee only award.
- The ESRC has relaxed the rules around international eligibility in strategic areas, allowing fees and stipends to be paid to students outside the UK. As a pilot NWDTC will be able to recruit students for awards in Economics and Advanced Quantitative Methods without adhering to the current residential eligibility rules as laid out in the ESRC PG training guidelines.

### **3. THE FINANCIAL BASIS OF THE AWARD**

A full postgraduate award for full-time study provides funds to meet:

- The payment of approved fees to the institution
- A maintenance grant and Research Training Support Grant (RTSG)

Rates for the academic year 2011-12 will be as follows:

Maintenance Grant	£13,590
RTSG	£ 750

Please note that:

- Students in Economics will also be eligible to receive an Enhanced stipend of £3,000 per year.
- Students in Advanced Quantitative Methods will be eligible to receive an enhanced stipend of £3,000 plus an extra £250 RTSG per year.

Students opting to study part time will receive a pro rata maintenance grant of the equivalent of a full time award.

Student will receive additional disability allowance where appropriate.

The ESRC also provides **fees-only** awards for eligible EU students. 'Fees-only' award holders are not eligible to receive a maintenance grant from the ESRC.

### **4. THE APPLICATION PROCESS**

#### **Application Form and Transcripts**

To apply for an award you must hold an offer of a place at one of the three NWDTC institutions. Then you will need to complete the ESRC application form at:

Copies of transcripts and references included in your original programme application will also be required for your ESRC application.

#### **Closing Date**

You should apply to one institution for admission onto your chosen postgraduate programme using the online application form:

You should complete the ESRC application form and attach your transcripts and references to the School Postgraduate Office/ Student Registry in which you intend to register by **5.00pm on 25<sup>th</sup> March 2011**. There is only one closing date for applications each year and there is no flexibility on this date.

## **5. ASSESSMENT OF APPLICATIONS**

### **a. The Pathway Panels**

Your application will be assessed by one of each institution's Pathway Panels. The panel consists of senior academics from within each pathway. Each application is judged on its own merits based on the information provided in the ESRC Application Form and your transcripts / references.

The panel agrees a mark for each application and applications are then ranked. The pathway panels will present their top applicants to a general institutional panel who will decide which applications will go through the final NWDTC studentship committee. The committee will then decide on studentship allocation across the DTC.

### **b. Outcome of Application**

The outcome of the NWDTC studentship committee will be known by the week of the 15<sup>th</sup> April 2011. Successful candidates will then be informed in writing. The panels will also agree a list of reserve candidates. If you are successful in being nominated for an award, you will be asked to confirm whether or not you wish to formally accept this.

### **c. Taking up an Award**

Award holders are normally expected to begin their programme of study on, or around, **19 September 2011** and, providing we have received all necessary paperwork, holders of a full award will receive the first instalment of their maintenance grant in early October. In certain circumstances, such as illness, or where there is a need to give a period of notice to an employer, we will consider deferring the start date of a doctoral programme, normally by up to three months (with approval from the School PG office). Any application for postponement must be made immediately through the University in which you intend to register. You should write to the University, in advance, including supporting letters from your potential supervisor. **Deferrals are not possible for masters' students.**

If you are unable to take up your award in the year in which it was awarded, it will be rescinded and you will have to re-apply in the competition in the following year, should an award be available. You will need to inform us of your decision at the earliest possible stage, in writing, by letter or e-mail.

The continuation of doctoral awards is subject to the submission of a satisfactory annual report at the end of each year of the award and you are subject to the University and school's standard monitoring and progression processes.

### **d. Change in circumstances**

Studentships are awarded for a particular programme of study at the University of Liverpool, Lancaster or Manchester. Therefore all requests to make changes to the awards are only considered by the North West DTC studentship committee in very exceptional circumstances and only if the reasons are fully and clearly explained.

### **e. Resubmitting Applications**

If you are unsuccessful in one year's competition you may apply in the next year's competition, should an award be available, without prejudice, providing you continue to meet the eligibility criteria for the scheme.

### **f. Appeals Process**

The competition is fierce and, inevitably, many highly qualified and strongly-supported applicants do not get an award. Each application receives careful scrutiny by the assessors, and their decision is reached in the context of competing applications.

Please follow the instructions below to complete your application form.

### 1. Studentships available:

Please tick the scheme you would like to apply for.

### 2. Institution you intend to register

Please select the University you are applying to and in which you intend to register.

### 3. Name and address

We need to be able to contact you between March and September. Under 'Address' you should provide the address at which you can be contacted for the majority of this period, if this is different to the address you have given on the University application form. Should you be unavailable during this period, you may provide the name and address of someone who can correspond for you in your absence.

### 4. Project details

#### - Award type: Fees only or full award

Please see residency eligibility under section 2 (page 2) for more details

#### - Mode of attendance

Part time students are only eligible for the maintenance grant on a pro-rata basis. Further information on awards and stipends can be found under section 3 (page 3).

#### - Programme/Pathway

Please indicate the programme or pathway which you intend to register (further details of accredited pathways can be found in Appendix 1). Please note that if you are unsure you should discuss this with your School Postgraduate Office or Student Registry.

#### - Project title

The appropriate title of the project should be entered. 1+3 and 2+2 students are asked to give the working title of the proposed area of study. The NWDTC recognises the title may change as the applicant progresses through the Masters course and the topic is refined.

### 5. PhD Proposal

Please give details of your PhD proposal in 1000 words. Please note whether you intend to do fieldwork abroad or learn a difficult language during your doctoral programme.

### 6. Qualifications

The student is expected to enter their relevant qualifications.

### 7. Relevant Experience

Please complete this section by entering the number of years of experience and give details. The examiners will use this information to establish any experience you have gained that might contribute to the intended research topic.

### 8. Supervision

Please state who your prospective supervisors will be according to your offer letter.

9. Project partners

Please only complete this section if you are applying for a CASE (Cooperative Award in Science and Engineering) or a collaborative award. Please note that before you can apply for a CASE award you must have discussed the collaboration with your supervisor and Institution. If no contact has been made with a partner, please apply for a generic studentship.

10. Research training previously undertaken

Please include a brief description of the relevant research training previously undertaken.

11. Research training needs

Please give details of any identified training needs for your doctoral programme and state whether or not this has been discussed with your supervisors.

12. Advance Quantitative training

Please detail if you will be undertaking any advance quantitative training during your doctoral programme and provide details of the training if known.

13. Additional applications

Please indicate whether you have already applied for other funding for this forthcoming year.

14. References and transcripts

You should provide two references along with your application and copies of your transcripts. These may be the same references / transcripts you submit with the standard University Application form.

15. Acknowledgment

Please sign and date the application form.
